Title: The Way to Live a Million Years

Author: Jean Duncan

This is a story about a ten-year-old boy named Luke. He was untidy, playful, cheeky, a little lazy and very greedy - just like most boys I know. However, Luke had cancer - a disease which made him very sick and might end his life in a few months, if what the doctors said really came true.

For some reason which even Luke's parents could not understand, Luke did not spend his time feeling miserable, whining about the torturous treatment or throwing tantrums about not being able to go outdoors to play with his friends. He told them that he did not want to waste time being unhappy. Instead, he embarked on a project to do something different every day, write about his experience, and post his thoughts on his blog to share with whoever was interested enough to read.

Trying to do something different every day sounded easier than it really was. Some days, Luke stared into space for hours, racking his brain for an idea. Thankfully, many people visited Luke and started to suggest all sorts of things he could do after they heard about his project. Even strangers who stumbled upon his blog while aimlessly browsing the Internet left comments to help him along in his project.

I was deeply saddened when Luke eventually succumbed to the disease. His optimism and zest for life moved me. Nothing seemed to be capable of bringing him down. Because he was such an inspiration to so many people, he will indeed live for a million years when his story gets passed on from generation to generation.


