I grew up in a small and peaceful village. Life was simple yet challenging. My parents worked tirelessly; their backs bent under the scorching sun as they ploughed the yellow dry soil laboriously – all just to earn enough to support the family.

Growing up, I did not dare to ask for anything more than the necessities for I knew the financial struggles of my family. One day, as I was walking along the streets, I saw a silk handkerchief on sale – one that all the girls around me seemed to have. As a young girl, I yearned to be a part of the popular group of girls in the village. Led astray by temptation, I made a regrettable decision. Upon returning home, I took some money from Father's drawer and bought it.

When Father discovered that his money had gone missing, he demanded to know who had stolen the money, holding a cane in his hand. Fear gripped me and I was speechless. He questioned my brother and me but neither of us spoke. Met with silence, he roared, "Fine! Both of you will be punished then!" Suddenly, my brother gripped my father's hand. "Pa, I did it." He shouldered the blame and the punishment in my place.

In the silence of the night, tears streamed down my cheeks as pangs of guilt consumed me. My brother's gentle voice broke through the darkness. "Jie, don't cry," he whispered. "It is okay. You're my sister." I will never forget my brother's expression when he uttered those words. My brother was eight then, and I was eleven. I blamed myself for not having enough courage to admit what I had done.

Years rolled by. My brother and I excelled academically, earning acceptance to top schools. However, with my parents' meagre income, paying the school fees became a challenge. One night, we overheard our parents' hushed conversation. "How are we to afford both of their school fees?" Mother sounded worried. "We will find a way, even if it means borrowing money from the entire village," Father sighed. "I can take on a cleaning job instead," Mother suggested. Father cut her off with a brush of his hand, "Farming is tiring enough." Hearing their words, tightness gripped my chest. I looked at my brother forlornly. With a smile on his face, he assured me, "It is okay, don't worry too much."

Before dawn, my brother slipped away from home with nothing but a few wom-out clothes. In the morning, I found a note that he had left on my pillow, promising to find work in order to send money to support my education. I held the note and cried bitterly, thinking about how my brother gave up his education because of me.

With the money borrowed from our neighbours in the village and my brother's earnings, I was able to continue my studies at the university. My brother's love and sacrifice were etched deeply in my heart, a constant reminder of his unwavering support for me.

The bond we shared stayed with us from childhood to adulthood. At my brother's wedding, he was asked, "Who is the one person you love the most?" Without even thinking, he answered, "My sister." He continued by sharing a story I could not even remember.

"When we were young, my sister and I had to walk two hours back home from school every day. One wintry day, I lost one of my gloves. My sister gave me one of hers. She wore only one glove all the way. When we got home, her fingers trembled as she 40 fumbled with her chopsticks, struggling to keep them steady. From that day on, I swore that as long as I lived, I would take care of her and do whatever it took to support her in all that she did." His words, a testament to the sacrifices he had made for me, brought tears to my eyes. In that moment, surrounded by love and celebration, I found myself overwhelmed with gratitude for the brother who had stood by my side all these years.

Yet, as I watched them dive, they seemed oblivious (55) the cold

Haenyeo usually dive in (56) to ensure safety. If one diver
encounters trouble, others are nearby to help. The net they use is attached to an orange
buoy (57) remains at the surface of the waters. This helps to mark

of their location. After each dive, the women rest on the shore
for a few minutes and prepare for the next dive, repeating the process many times
throughout the day.
Watching these women dive, I could not help but feel inspired. Haenyeo teach us

of what they do. Their commitment to each other, their love for the sea, and their
