



I grew up in the 1980s Singapore. I suffered from Stargardt disease* and started losing my sight at eight. With my sight worsening every few months, I barely scraped through most years in school. I was very dejected and felt that I was letting my parents down.

Mother was determined to help me thrive in school. Besides helping me revise schoolwork every evening, she met up with my teachers to request for their help because of my diminishing vision. This took up a lot of her time, but she never complained.

Sadly, no one had prior experience in helping children with a vision impairment. All that my teachers could do was to enlarge the size of my worksheets, and to place me at the front of the class.

I also struggled socially in school. My visual impairment made it difficult for me to participate in many activities. For instance, one favourite outdoor game then was zero-point**. Members of opposing teams would jump across the "rope", which was raised higher each time it was cleared. My attempts to play the game with limited sight were often unsuccessful, and therefore, nobody wanted me to be in their team.

Such social challenges caused me to struggle with my identity—often asking "Who am I?". Perhaps it was because I had yet to accept my disability, or I valued being accepted by those around me. I wanted to be with the "cool kids" and longed to be included in school. I tried emulating them by dressing up like them.

This desire to fit in sometimes led me to make poor decisions. Once, when I was 12, Mother was away on a trip. I left the house to meet some classmates, taking Mother's high heels with me. We went to a beauty salon for my first makeover. The beautician painted my toenails red, then puffed and brushed away at my face. When she finished, I stood up and carefully put on Mother's heels. My friends watched and praised how I looked. Basking in their compliments, I thought that I was finally as "cool" as them.

Little did I know that when we went to a nearby McDonald's for lunch, <u>disaster</u> awaited! Father was at the same McDonald's! When Father saw me tottering in, he looked utterly bewildered! He angrily dragged me home. Puzzled, I stumbled and tried to keep up, with my feet aching in the heels. Once we reached home, Father sent me off to scrub my face clean and banished me to my room.

When Mother came home and found out what had happened, she patiently explained to me that I was dressed inappropriately for my age. She said that both she and Father were worned that I was not being true to myself and suggested that I should make choices that were appropriate for me. At first, I felt upset, but then I realised Mother was right. I learned an important lesson that day.
