





The extract below is taken from an online article on shampoos.

Unlike how they are advertised, most shampoos in the market are similar in composition and function. They share common key ingredients such as water, detergents, conditioners and preservatives. While manufacturers boast real benefits and unmatched effectiveness, a closer look at the ingredient lists reveals striking similarities across brands and product types.

The differences between brands often lie in slight variations in the ingredients or the amount of each ingredient used. However, the differences between products of the same brand often lie in the fragrances and dyes used or the marketing claims made rather than variations in their basic components. Thus, the remarkable effects splashed across their packaging are often misleading. The truth is, we do not need to be picky when selecting shampoos unless a dermatologist recommends one that scientifically helps to deal with specific hair and scalp issues.
