

Grandmother was a remarkable storyteller. As her granddaughter, I was privileged to enjoy her tales of life in Singapore during the early days which were filled with vivid details and lessons that stayed with me long after she was gone.

Grandmother was part of the first generation of Singaporeans, her mother having travelled across the sea from a small province in China. She often shared that though the later part of her life was filled with happy memories, her teenage years were fraught with danger due to the Japanese Occupation in Singapore.

To help care for the family amidst the harsh realities of a war-forn country, Grandmother needed to find work while looking like a boy as most menial jobs were given to males. She chopped off her luscious locks and wore baggy clothes. She managed to get a job carrying hefty sacks with her scrawny frame — my heart would break thinking about how difficult it must have been for her. Yet, Grandmother thought nothing of it, saving the only challenging part was providing for the family with her meagre earnings.

Apart from the need to do hard labour, the war also caused Grandmother to drop out of school. She often complained that she would be so much smarter if she were educated. I have always felt otherwise as my grandmother was one of the sharpest people I knew. Honed by years of bargaining and negotiating discounts at the market, her mental calculations were legendary and she was also able to think on her feet.

However, beneath Grandmother's shrewdness, her generosity overflowed. She mentioned frequently that food was scarce during those years. Despite that, the doors to her family home in the *kampung** were always open to anyone who needed a hot meal. She conjured up delicious meals with sweet potatoes and leafy greens which were planted in her backyard. She was also fortunate to have a neighbour working in a noodle factory as he would give out unsold packets of noodles fortnightly. She recalled the times she witnessed people eating food that had rotted because they were simply too hungry. She realised then that she should **count her blessings** and share whatever she could with others who were struggling.


There was one particular incident that Grandmother shared which remain etched in my mind. Rowdy soldiers had ventured into the *kampung*, hurling insults and destroying property for a good one hour. Everyone in the neighbourhood was too afraid to confront them until Grandmother, fuelled by righteous anger, charged out of the house with her broom. "Afraid of the likes of them? Neverl I'm afraid only of their weapons – which is what this is for!" Grandmother declared while waving the broom in the air. Upon seeing her actions, the rest of the neighbours followed suit by arming themselves with pots, pans, and even hangers. The entire *kampung* banded together to chase the soldiers out. Seeing that, the soldiers retreated, vowing to return for revenge. Grandmother was worried they would do just that, but heaved a sigh of relief when news broke a few days later that the Japanese had surrendered and all their soldiers had left Singapore.

The war reared its ugly head and took its toll on Grandmother. Nonetheless, her experiences taught her important life lessons – to always help one another and stand up against injustice. Now, each time I face trouble in life, I remember Grandmother's bravery through the daunting challenges she faced in her life and am inspired to be like her.
