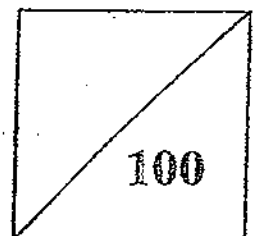

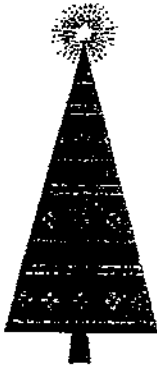

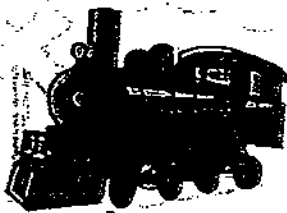

Butterfly populations are declining throughout the world. The destruction of habitat, through the removal of forests and grasslands, is the main cause. Worsening the situation are the use of pesticides, collection by people and the scourge of diseases. But you can do something to help butterflies. Without much time or effort, you can actually create an attractive environment in the green spaces around you for these beautiful insects to feed and reproduce in safety. We are talking about butterfly gardens. 5

Just a few steps will lead you to the creation of one. The first step for you is to find out the species of flowers that are inviting to butterflies found in your area. What really attract them are strongly scented, brightly coloured flowers rich in nectar for their nourishment. Butterflies also need trees, shrubs and leafy green plants to lay their eggs. Don't forget that caterpillars feed on leaves to grow and transform themselves into adults. 10

Next, you will want to consider the arrangement of flowers, shrubs and other plants in your butterfly garden. Combining plants of different heights will certainly offer protection as well as food. For example, short flowering plants like bee palm and lavender may be grown with taller, sturdier trees and shrubs like poplar, hibiscus and lantana. 15

The best possible magnet of your garden is a rich variety of flowering plants. But you need not separate them into different beds of the similar species or colours. Nor do you need to tend the garden with special care to rid it of weeds and wildflowers. In enhancing the charm of your garden, you can be comfortable with letting nature takes its course. That way, you would gradually see more and more plants that are native to your area appear in the garden, drawing butterflies that are associated with them. 20 25

A sunny spot makes a good location for a butterfly garden. This is necessary because butterflies cannot regulate their body temperatures. Also, you should have sheltered parts and windbreaks in your butterfly garden for the insects to sleep at night and hide during bad weather. Remember to provide some rocks or exposed surfaces to allow butterflies to rest with wings outstretched to soak up sunlight. A small, nice butterfly garden will go a long way in contributing to the conservation of our delightful winged insects. 30

With his eyes raised just above the tree-root, Suchai focused on the section of the jungle ahead. Moments later, his hunch turned out to be right. It all happened quickly. Heavy pounding of the hard-baked ground, forceful shaking of branches and a rustling shower of leaves heralded the emergence of a huge creature. "An elephant!" Thipong gasped. 20 25

It was no ordinary elephant. The animal soon revealed itself fully. "Is it sick?" Thipong asked. He noticed its white eyes, which were unlike those of

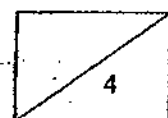
