

Introduction

In survival situations, the will to survive is all important. Ultimately, your mind controls your body, and when the mind gives up, the body will fail to survive. Without doubts, the most important aids to survival are the abilities to remain calm and optimistic, and to concentrate the mind and adapt to the new situation.

Preparation

- In survival circumstances at sea, it is better to retain clothing when in the water. Before abandoning a ship or an aircraft, take whatever warm clothing is available.
- Wrap a towel around your neck (to prevent heat loss) and take a torch if one is available. Do not jump into the water with an inflated life jacket, as the impact may be dangerous.
- If time allows, fill containers with clean water and stow them on the lifeboat or life raft. A person can last for more than a week without food, but without clean water to drink, your life expectancy is measured in days.

Signalling with light

Light

If you are using signal lights, send 6 flashes in one minute, then allow one minute's pause. Then send 6 more flashes, and so on. A green light from an aircraft will mean that the message is understood.

Fire

Three fires in a triangle is an internationally recognised distress signal. They can also be in a straight line with a 25-metre gap. It is difficult to maintain three fires over a long period, so if necessary have one burning and two more ready to light if required.

Mirror

Signals from a mirror or similar reflective materials are very effective and can be easily seen from the air. You can use a suitably burnished shiny object, like the inside of your survival tin, or even an old compact disc. Don't flash it too long into the cockpit of a nearby aircraft, as it can blind the pilot. Always practise signalling before you need it - better to get it right the first time!

Growing up in Singapore in the 1940's, amid the deprivation brought about by the war, the idea of keeping a dog was never a consideration. So, when my daughter, then eleven years old, asked me if we could have a dog when we were based in New York, the answer was no. The reason was that I knew that she would tire of the animal soon and that I would be responsible for looking after it. As this was not a reason which could resonate with an eleven year old, I had to refuse on the grounds that the streets of New York were too dangerous for a child her age to walk a dog.

Alas, when we returned to Singapore in the mid-1990s, this reason was no longer credible. As such, there was a half-hearted agreement to look for a suitable Labrador retriever. One day, after lunch in Upper Thomson Road, we made a detour to a pet shop nearby. There was no intention to buy anything. It was just an attempt to mollify a young girl and to put off to a future date any idea of buying a dog.

Needless to say, it did not work out as I had planned. After several minutes of looking around, we came across a rascally little collie that would not stop licking and nibbling our fingers. We fell in love with him instantly. Penni, my wife, like all women, was more firm. She came up with all the practical reasons a collie, with its long and thick mane, would be unsuitable in Singapore's hot weather. But it was one against three and before we knew it, I was at the counter paying for the puppy and all the paraphernalia that apparently was needed to look after it.

Back home, the work of raising a puppy began in earnest. First, we had to come up with a name for it and it turned out to be more difficult than I had anticipated. Common names were not acceptable to my daughter. She eventually came up with "Shakespeare", a name which would amuse strangers wherever we went. There was much to learn about raising a puppy. We tried without too much success in the first weeks to house train him, and soon the garden had become a ventable mine field of dog poo.

Then, there were the crazy antics of this little fur ball. He would dash around blindly and without any real aim until stopped by some immovable object. Once, he ran into the glass sliding door and we discovered that dogs, too, have a set of milk teeth. Two of these fell off much to our distress and the vet had to be woken up close to midnight.

Shakespeare is one of the most gentle, friendly and attentive dogs around. When we have visitors to stay, he will, once he gets used to them, put his head on their lap and look up longingly at them, imploring them to play with him. His gentle nature has over the years convinced many friends to have a dog as pet. He is attentive to people and can make them feel welcome. Family members, in particular, have been greeted, each time they come and see us after an absence even of several years, with a long spell of barking.

All these years, Shakespeare has been a constant and faithful companion to me. If I have hardly any complaints about my health, this is largely due to the long walks which we took every morning without fail.
