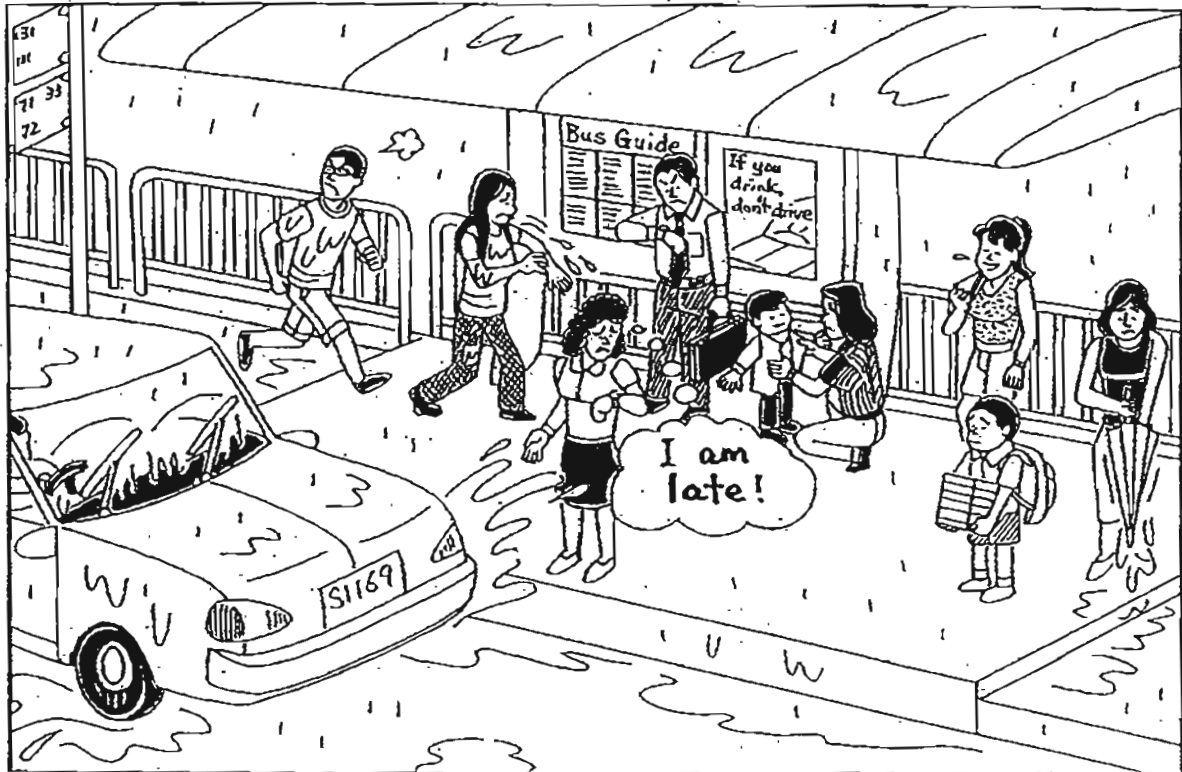

The first dim light of day was cutting through the winter landscape as Karen Nelson peered out of the window. Another snowstorm had been forecast, and she was concerned. Karen had just started on her shift as a cook at a nursing home. "I want to get back ahead of the storm," she told two co-workers, who lived nearby.

Karen slipped into her blue pickup at 6.45 a.m. and headed west on Highway 25. Within minutes, snow was swirling around her vehicle. The road was barely visible, and in the heavy gusts of snow, she was soon disoriented. On and on she drove until the pickup lurched to the right and stopped. Karen pushed the gas pedal but heard only the sickening whine of tires spinning on ice. She shifted into reverse; the truck would not budge. Looking out at the blizzard howling across the prairie, she felt a stab of fear. Karen reached for the cellular phone. Her husband, Marvin, who worked at an institution counselling the mentally handicapped, would be home now in the big farmhouse. 10 15

"Marv," she said, "I'm stuck."

Marvin considered looking for Karen himself but decided that would be foolish. His van lacked four-wheel drive and probably would get stuck. He advised her to call the sheriff's office in Webster. Moments later, Karen reached the dispatcher who assured her that a deputy would be right along to pull her out. 20

At the farm, Marvin was worried that Karen would run out of gas before they found her. Without heat, she would suffer hypothermia. He reminded her that there were long johns and coveralls behind her seat and an insulated sleeping bag in the back. Karen immediately retrieved the sleeping bag. 25

After three hours of a futile search, Sheriff Nelson started to worry. He was afraid Karen might have driven straight past Highway 25, and turned into another road. Time was critical. Karen had no food or water. Once the pickup ran out of gas, she would lose her heat source, and the battery would die. So would the cell phone. At 4 p.m. Nelson received the call he had been dreading from his dispatcher: she's run out of gas. 30

Fighting the cold, Karen struggled into the long johns, and coveralls, then wrapped herself in the fleece-lined sleeping bag. She felt a shudder of fear and shook herself. *You've got to think positively, she thought.* Happy memories of her grandson Tyler building a fort of pillows in the living room and calling out to her came to mind. 35

A call from the sheriff interrupted her thoughts. "It looks like you'll have to spend the night, Karen," he said. "The blizzard hasn't let up, and it's zero visibility out there. We'll find you in the morning. Keep wriggling your fingers and toes. You need to stay awake." She knew what he meant. If she fell asleep, she might never wake up. 40

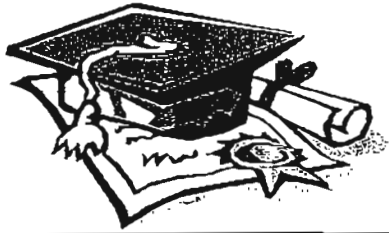

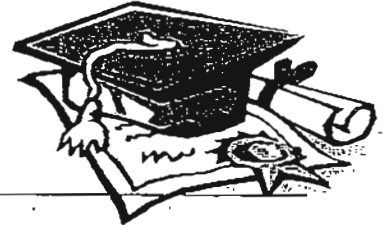
