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Danelle Ballengee, 35, was a world-class endurance athlete who had run in over 500 long-distance competitions through deserts and mountains around the world.

Up ahead, Taz disappeared, but Danelle did not worry as she sci inbled along a remote rocky trail to the top of a ridge of deep-coloured red rock. Near the summit, her foot hit a patch of ice. She scraped over solid stone as she fell over a steep cliff. She slammed feet first 5 onto a narrow rock ledge and collapsed.

She could wiggle her toes but when she tried to stand, pain shot through her. Her pelvis and several of her vertebrae were shattered. The lower half of her body was a useless, dead mass.

Danelle looked at her watch. It was noon. She estimated she was ten kilometres from her truck and trapped high on a hidden desert ledge in winter. Alone. Then she heard Taz.

He ran down from the summit and huddled over her. Danelle stroked his thick coat. If she remained still, her pain subsided, and she could think her way out of this trap. She would follow Taz down the path to the carryon floor and crawl back to her truck.

She rolled onto her stomach and screamed so loudly Taz jumped. The canyon floor was hundreds of metres below, down a rocky path. Taz went ahead of Danelle who began clawing forward over rocks and patches of snow. Taz trotted down the trail, then back, wondering why Danelle was not running alongside him. Willing herself through the pain, she concentrated on her task.

Five hours later, Danelle reached the canyon bottom, scraped and bruised. She was 500—20 metres closer to her goal. She flopped onto her back, exhausted. Then she noticed an ice-covered hole. She leaned into the hole and drank deeply. She would need water if she was going to crawl out tomorrow. Danelle dipped her empty water bottle into the pool, but it came out full of silt. She used the lid to slowly scoop water from the surface. It took over 50 scoops to get enough. She finally stopped as spills were freezing her fingers. Danelle reached out to 25 her companion and he curled into a ball next to her. Putting her arms around him, she felt his warmth, and held on.

As the hours were on. Danelle tried to distract herself from the pain and cold, Danelle stared into the clear night sky, talked to Taz and counted shooting stars with him. It hum incredibly to move but if she didn't, her core temperature would drop and she would die of 30 hypothermia. So she flexed her muscles, tapped her feet and lifted her head off the rock in a small sit-up. Pain nagged constantly. She continued a series of crunches. Her abdomen ached. Throughout the night, she took sips of water, realizing that if she drank too much, she'd urinate and the liquid would freeze on her legs.

At Thursday's first light, Danelle turned'over and dragged herself forward. She was barely 35 moving now. She pushed hard, scraping her finger, knuckles and knees till they bled. She crawled from first light to 4pm but became dehydrated and had to return to the water hole. The day had been wasted.

As darkness and temperature fell, pain and hunger started to take their toll. Danelle was afraid of predators and called to Taz to stay close.

Jewell New excelled in persuading lions to ride motorcycles. New took six months coaxing his favourite lion, Kenneth, to join him on his bike. "At first the cat wouldn't go near the bike," he said, "then he wouldn't get off."

Kenneth was a mature four and a half year old specimen when he began to learn riding pillion. New was just beginning his career and did not have money to buy a suitable flashy motorcycle. He had to trade in his watch collection and a spare tyre in part exchange. Kenneth showed a *natural sense of balance* as New roared around the ring on the motorcycle, but his master sometimes complained of back strain after supporting the 190-kilo beast's head and paws on his shoulders.

New would spend the winter months in Fforida training 15 male lions to go through their paces for a 10 minute act that he presented during the summer season for The Greatest Show on Earth, the showcase of the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey. New always denied exploiting lions. "I take all the risks they do,"he said.

This came home to him at a *tlcklish moment* with another lion, Buddy.

Although Buddy had been bottle fed by New from the age of two days, he proved less tractable than Kenneth. He turned awkward at the climax of the act, when New put his head inside his jaws.

"He just kept it there," New recalled. "He didn't bite me, he just held me in place with his teeth. When he decided at last to let me go, my groom asked me why I'd kept my head in there for such a long time." New decided in future to use a different lion for that particular trick.

New became fond of animals white working on his family's farm. His experience as a keeper at the city zoo in Dallas as a university student enabled him to find jobs with different jungle theme parks in the country after he graduated. New only learned fron taming by experiment after joining Ringling Brothers Circus World in Florida. "The first day I asked the groom to let them in the cage with me," he remembered, "and we got acquainted. I soon figured out what to look out for."

He took to the road for the first time with Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey's 108th annual tour. He said that he felt more nervous in front of a circus audience than in a cage with a dozen Nubian lions. But his first triumph with Kenneth would always be the high point of his life.
