Sleep is one of the most talked-about topics among parents. A good night's sleep sets a child up for the day. It helps children deal with the pressures of a busy school environment and also promotes learning. Sleep is essential for growing brains.

Children have long been trying to rebel against set bedtimes. Today there 5 are more and more distractions to keep them awake and alert and out of bed for longer Television, the internet, talking on their mobile phones and playing video games all compete for their bedtime attention. While it may seem that your children are the only ones still up and about at 10 p.m., the reality is that many children struggle to get a good night's rest. Difficulty in falling asleep, trouble 10 staying asleep, early morning awakening and nightmares are among the most common problems affecting our children.

All children differ in the amount of sleep they require. Throughout his childhood and adolescence, my son seemed to function perfectly well on a fraction of the sleep his two sisters needed. I came to realise there is not a 15 compulsory number of hours for children at certain ages. Instead, there is a range for each age group. Most preschoolers need ten to twelve hours a day. At age nine, it is closer to ten hours. When puberty hits, kids still need between eight and nine hours of sleep, yet most of them get less than this. And for teenagers, just at the time when their schedules typically overflow with activities, the developing 20 body and brain place extra demands on their systems and sleep needs ramp up again.

Children under thirteen begin to secrete a hormone that makes them sleepy at around 8 or 9 o'clock at night. Most teenagers secrete the hormone at around 11 p.m., so any time before this is a no-sleep zone for teenagers. They 25 physically cannot fall asleep. At the other end of the sleep zone is another chemical responsible for waking us up. It is not secreted in teenagers until around 8.15a.m., and that is usually too late to make it to school on time. For parents who are trying to get their children out on time in the morning, this sleepiness can easily be misinterpreted as laziness. Instead of giving warnings or well-meaning 30 motivational lectures, try to realise that your teenager is just battling his or her body function. It may be better to try to be his brain for a time – do the thinking for him.

It was a cold, wet day on 6 June 2007, when a 14-year-old Wasana arrived at St Anthony's College in the seaside district of Galle, Sri Lanka. Waiting outside his classroom for his classmates to arrive, Wasana stared idly at the torrential rain. Then his gaze fell upon the 18-metre-high hill that rose at the back of the classroom.

He noticed an enormous amount of rainwater flowing down the hill, and water was also bubbling at the base of a boulder on the hill. For a few minutes, Wasana stared at the water, wondering why it looked so familiar. Then it hit him—the scene was alarmingly similar to the slides he was shown during Disaster Management classes. The course was conducted at schools located near the sea following the 2004 Boxing Day tsunami, which killed more that 30 000 Sri Lankans.

Fearing an impending disaster, Wasana swung into action. "Run, run, don't stay here! The rocks on the hill are going to fall on us!" he shouted as he gesticulated wildly at students waiting outside their classrooms. Chaos broke out as the students ran to the open area that had been designated as an emergency gathering point. When some teachers approached Wasana, he showed them the water gushing from the hill, and they started leading the students to safe ground.

Just then, Principal Nihal drove into the school compound. Wasana ran over to tell him what was happening. After inspecting the site where the water was bubbling up from the ground, Nihal knew the school was in serious trouble. A 20 farmer himself, he understood how easily soil can be washed away in these conditions. The enormous boulder at the top of the hill could come crashing down at any minute. Leading a group of school employees and older students, Nihal climbed the hill and tried to divert the water flow from the boulder. They were too late! Ten minutes after they started their frantic work, they heard screams as the 25 massive rock hurtled down the hill on an avalanche of sand, rock and mud. There was little Nihal and his group could do as they watched the earth engulf an entire school block.

When Wasana returned home later that day, his white uniform covered in mud, he received an earful from his mother. He tried to explain that he had saved 30 two hundred schoolmates but she did not believe him. His mother finally realized he was telling the truth when she saw a television report about the disaster. With pride, she hugged Wasana and said that he was indeed a hero.

Thanks to Wasana, no one was hurt in the incident. The landslide destroyed two classrooms and caused extensive damage to six others. The repairs, costing

\$27 000, included a new retaining wall on the hill to prevent future landslides. "The financial damage is nothing compared to what would have happened had there been children in the classrooms," Nihai says. Looking back, Wasana says he did not think twice about the ridicule that would have ensued if he had been wrong about the landslide. "It would be worse if I did not do anything when I already knew it was going to happen. He added, "I feel disaster management lessons are important for everyone. We will never know when the knowledge will come in handy."
