



Early on a clear November morning in the Mojave Desert, a full moon is sinking over the bright glare of Las Vegas. Nevada Solar One is sleeping but the day's work is about to begin.

It is hard to imagine that a power plant could be so beautiful: 100 hectares of gently curved mirrors lined up like canals of light. Parked facing the ground overnight, 5 they are starting to awaken — more than 182 000 of them — and follow the sun:

"Looks fike it will be 370 degree Celsius today," says one of the operators in the control room. His job is to monitor the rows of mirrors as they concentrate sunlight on long steel pipes filled with circulating oil, heating it as high as 400 degree Celsius. The heat produces steam, driving a turbine and dynamo, to generate enough to electrify 10 14 000 households or a few Las Vegas casinos.

When Nevada Solar One came on line in 2007, it was the first large solar power plant to be built in the United States in more than 17 years. During that time, solar technology blossomed elsewhere. Power plants such as Nevada Solar One use solar energy which collects the sun's rays via mirrors to produce heat.

Putting on hard hats and dark glasses, plant manager Robert Cable and I drive out to take a closer look at the mirrors. **Men with a water truck** are spraying water at the mirrors. **"Any kind of dust affects them,"** Cable explains.

On a clear summer day with the sun directly overhead, Nevada Solar One can convert about 20 percent of the sun's rays into electricity. Gas plants are more efficient 20 but this fuel is free and it does not emit carbon dioxide.

"If we talk about renewable sources of energy like geothermal or wind, they are limited in their quantity. However, energy from the sun is virtually unlimited," said Eicke Weber, director of the Fraunhofer Institute for Solar Energy Systems, in Germany.

Solar energy may be unlimited but its potential is barely tapped. Nevada Solar 25 One was built because the state had set a deadline requiring utilities to generate 20 percent of their power from renewable sources by 2015. To bring down costs and reduce the need for funding from the government and other incentives, engineers from various solar power plants in the United States are studying mirrors made from lightweight polymers instead of glass. They are also studying tubes that will absorb 30 more sunlight and lose less heat. In addition, they are working on solar power's biggest problem: how to store some of the heat produced during daylight hours for release later on.



He said, "I'm from the orphanage, I can chop some wood today."

"You?" I asked.

"I've been chopping wood at the orphanage a long time."

I visualised mangled and inadequate branches for my fires. I was busy with my work and not inclined to conversation.

"Very well, there's the axe. Go ahead and see what you can do."

I went back to work, closing the door. The boy began to chop. The blows were rhythmic and steady, and shortly, I forgot about him, the sound no more of an interruption than a consistent rain. After about an hour, I stopped and stretched and heard the boy's steps on the cabin steps. I opened the door.

The boy said, "I have to go to supper now. I can come again tomorrow evening."

"I'll pay you for what you've done. Ten cents an hour?" I said, thinking I should probably have to insist on an older boy.

"Anything is all right."

We went together to the back of the cabin. There, neatly stacked against the cabin wall was a splendid pile of wood. An astonishing amount of solid wood had been cut. He had done as much as a man.

I looked at him and he looked at me with his clear grey-blue eyes. A light came over him, as though the setting sun had touched him with a suffused glory. I gave him thirty cents.

"You may come tomorrow," I said, and thank you very much.
