

Fay was instantly alert. She was very sensitive to everything as a new mother. She leapt to her feet, peered out through the grass at the mouth of the cave and gasped.

Outside the cave, the evening sun cast the long shadow of a wolf.

Fay knew that once the wolf had picked up their scent, she would not be satisfied with a good meal. No matter how many snakes she hurled out of the cave, it would not be enough to persuade the wolf to leave. She would wait by the entrance to the cave, eat the snakes and then with her energy restored, charge into the cave and tuck into the jackals. She would not leave until all the jackals were dead.

The only way Fay's two-week-old pups could make it through this would be to stay where they were, out of sight, and not make a sound, but that was wishful thinking. The grey wolf clearly had sharp eyes, sharp ears and a sharp sense of smell. Fay knew the wolf had already discovered the cave with its jackal den inside. The wolf's tail was up, straight as a stick, and her mouth had widened slightly revealing a set of sharp white fangs.

Fay was so tense she could hardly breathe. Right now, she could not think of a way out of this situation. The wolf was inching closer to the cave. At that critical moment, she made a mistake. She was worried that the pups might cry out or try to move that she held them tightly to her body. She just wanted them to be quiet. When the male-pup tried to pull away, Fay held him down firmly as if to say, "I need you to be quiet!" But the pup was uncomfortable. He became quite violent and bit her. As though stung by a red ant, Fay flinched instinctively and let go of him. The pup pulled away and squealed with relief. The female-pup followed him and the two squealed in unison. They were so small, so young and had no concept of danger.

The grey wolf stopped. She gave a low growl, and scoured the cave with her bright green eyes. From the wolf's raised hair and the tension in the bend of her legs, Fay knew that the wolf had found them and was preparing to attack.

Without thinking, she grabbed the female-pup by the scruff of her neck and bounded out of the cave. It wasn't that Fay was a coward in the face of danger or that she was selfishly putting her own life before that of her pups. If she felt that she had even a twenty percent chance of beating the wolf, she would not have hesitated for one moment to give that grey wolf the fight of her life. It would be suicidal. She was only two-thirds the size of a wolf; her teeth were not as sharp and she was not as strong. She knew she had no chance. If she died, what hope was there for her pups? Either the wolf would eat them or they would die of hunger.

Her strategy was to take one pup. There was less chance of losing them both at once if she split them up. If the wolf did not chase after her, she would at least have the female-pup. On the other hand, if the wolf did come after her, she would run and run, twisting and turning in every direction till the grey wolf lost her bearings. She would then sacrifice the female-pup and seize the opportunity to return to the cave. This was her area where she had lived all her life. She knew it so well that she could return to the cave, to the male-pup even when blindfolded. Lose one, save the other - what an awful choice for a mother to make.
