



Harry Houdini, one of the most famous magicians of all time, was the master of grand tricks and spectacular escape acts. Born on 24 March 1874. Houdini was one of seven children born to a Jewish priest and his wife. At the age of thirteen, he and his family moved to New York City. It was there that he became interested in magic and tricks.

In 1894, Houdini launched his career as a professional magician. Though his magic met with little success, he drew attention for his feats of escape using handcuffs.

In 1899, Houdini's acts caught the attention of an entertainment manager who soon got him performing across countries in Europe. Houdini's 10 feats would involve the local police, who would search him to make sure he was not hiding any key on himself. They would then handcuff him and lock him in a jail cell. They would return minutes later to find the handcuffs there, the doors still locked but Houdini missing. The show was a huge success and Houdini soon became the highest-paid performer.

In 1912, Houdini's act reached its peak. The escape from a Chinese Water Torture Cell was the hallmark of his career. Houdini was suspended by his feet and lowered upside-down into a locked glass cabinet filled with water. The audience gave a thunderous applause when he made his escape by holding his breath for more than three minutes. An ordinary 20 human being can only hold his breath for less than a minute in water. The performance remained popular until his death in 1926.

After his death, Houdini's props were sold to a magician and collector, Sidney Radner. These were displayed in a museum until they were 25 sold at an auction in 2004. Most of the prized pieces, including the Water Torture Cell, went to another world-famous magician, David Copperfield.
