A long time ago, people thought that their emotions came from their hearts perhaps because their hearts beat faster when they were afraid or excited. Now we know that emotions come from the brain which instructs the heart to speed up.

Your heart is about the size of your fist and is located a little to the left of the middle of your chest. There are many types of muscles in your body but the heart is special because, unlike other muscles, it never gets tired. It sends blood around the body. The blood delivers oxygen and nutrients to every cell of your body and carries away the waste. It is like a food delivery service and a refuse collector rolled into one!

Your heart has two pumps. The right side of your heart receives blood from the body and pumps it to the lungs to get oxygen. The left side of your heart does the opposite: it receives oxygen-rich blood from the lungs and pumps it out to the body.

You have probably guessed that the blood does not just slosh around your body once it leaves your heart. Instead, it moves through many tubes called arteries and veins. Arteries carry blood away from your heart whilst veins carry it back.

Although you cannot see your heart, there is a cool way of detecting it. If you gently press the side of your neck just below your jaw or the inside of your wrist just below your thumb, you will feel a rhythmical throbbing. This is your pulse. You can make your pulse faster by moving vigorously.

To measure your pulse, use a watch with a second hand to count the number of beats in one minute. Did it beat about ninety times a minute? This is much slower than a baby's heart which beats about a hundred and twenty times a minute. When you become an adult, your heart will slow down to about eighty beats a minute.

Did you know that a large mammal has a considerably slower pulse than a smaller one? An elephant's heart, for example, beats only about twenty-five times a minute whereas that of a tiny mammal like a mouse hammers away at about five hundred beats a minute!
