In recent months, many Singaporeans have developed a growing protest against personal mobility devices (PMDs), which have left riders and pedestrians with all manners of injuries from deep cuts to fractures and concussions.

These PMDs, such as electric scooters and electric unicycles, are popular with riders for daily commutes and deliverymen whose livelihoods depend on them. Despite efforts to regulate their use, safety concerns persist and criticisms are mounting to keep them off footpaths and the void decks of public housing estates.

Many countries around the world have to grapple and try to resolve the problems and dangers posed by these vehicles. Some have laid down speed limits or barred them from footpaths. Germany banned e-scooters from pavements whereas France has laid down speed limits. In the United Kingdom, they are only allowed on private property.

Dr Lee Bee Wah, a Member of Parliament, asked if Singapore could follow Germany's ban. She said, "Allowing PMDs on footpaths poses danger to the pedestrians." She also commented that some of her residents are worried when walking on footpaths.

Dr Lam Pin Min, Senior Minister of State for Transport, replied that it was not a good solution to impose such a ban on them. He added that Singaporeans should be encouraged to ride responsibly and only at allowed places.
