When I was just a few months old, my parents realised that I might have a hearing problem as I did not react to sounds. They tried all sorts of things, even banging two frying pans together, to get me to respond but to no avail.

My parents were devastated after the doctor examined me and confirmed that I had profound hearing loss. They were advised to put me in a special school so I could learn to communicate. Therefore, I attended Canossian School for the Hearing Impaired in Singapore when I was four years old. There, I learned to sign and had the opportunity to mix with other hearing-impaired children.

However, my mother found it a bit hard to take in the sight of all the hearing-impaired children interacting with one another. Thereafter, my parents sent me to private speech therapy classes where I learned to read lips and pronounce words. In 1989, my parents decided that I should go to a mainstream school to "lead a normal life". Although it would be a difficult transition for me, we still took the risk.

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My parents approached the principal of Bukit Batok Primary School who admitted me on the condition that I met the scholastic requirement of at least 75 per cent in each subject. My mother pushed me hard because she wanted to prove to the principal that her son could do anything when given the opportunity.

The mainstream school's pace was faster and it was not always easy to pay attention, especially when the teacher had her back to the class while writing on the board. Hence, my mother would call some of my classmates every day to check what had been taught in school. We also did a lot of extra work together after school. Her persistence paid off when I graduated from primary school with excellent grades.

I chose to attend Saint Thomas Secondary School which was able to accommodate my special needs. I worked hard and went on to be one of my school's top students for 'O' levels. With my grades, I made it to National Junior Gollege. I excelled and obtained 4 As for my 'A' level examination.

Since then, I have gone on to win a scholarship to pursue Computing at the National University of Singapore. I have also achieved numerous things in life outside school.


