Spreading the Love for Endangered Animals

Cuddly Baby Pandas

Pandas start out small — about the size of a stick of butter. The mother panda cares for her young until they are ready to venture out on their own. It does not leave the den when the cubs are still young.

The panda cubs are nursed until about 18 months of age, but will begin to eat bamboo at about 7 to 9 months. Pandas spend over 12 hours a day eating.



Funny Baby Plamy Slow Loris

The pygmy slow loris is nocturnal. It sleeps in the day while gripping a branch with its hands and feet. Its grasp is so strong that the animal can hang by one leg and feed in this position.

The name 'loris' comes from the Dutch word for clown, which describes the animal's wide-open eyes and facial markings and its acrobatic and comical positions as it moves about. When confronted, the loris will usually 'freeze' in midmovement.

There was no choice: I knew I had to do something. I decided to try to roll it. What an effort! It was a backbreaking task, but I was making great progress in rolling it a few times. However, a giant wave picked the whale up and pushed it back, despite my efforts to 20 brace against it.

Dejected, I fell backwards underneath the whale and, as the water receded, found myself in a sitting position with the baby whale in my lap. I could not move. When the next wave began to roll in, I could feel the panic rising inside me as the water quickly surged up to my chin, engulfing me. I took a deep breath and went under.

Luckily the whale became buoyant and I was able to scramble out from under it. I quickly turned it face first into the oncoming waves. It worked! With each rising wave, I slowly pushed the hapless creature further into the deeper water until it was floating. When the next big wave came, I was horrified to see it turned sideways again, and heading back to the shallows.
