Sleep is an important part of everyday life. We need to have enough of it for our body to function at its (21) optimum. A lack of sleep can result in one being grumpy, tired and having a lack of focus. Generally speaking, how much sleep a person needs is dependent on his age. Toddlers need about 10-12 hours of sleep a day, primary school-going children need about 10 hours of sleep, while (22) adolescents need about 8-9 hours of sleep.

Thank goodness someone had a camera. Otherwise, no one would have believed it. On 16 August 1996, a three-year-old boy was visiting the Brookfield Zoo in Illinois with his parents when he somehow crawled over a wall. He lost his balance and fell six metres into a gorilla habitat.

"The gorilla's got my baby!" the boy's mother shouted. Bystanders stared helplessly down into the Tropic World exhibit where the little boy lay on the concrete floor, unconscious. The child was totally at the mercy of the gorillas.

"I feared the worst," said Jeff Bruno, a paramedic who rushed to the scene.

But then something amazing happened. One of the gorillas went over to the unconscious boy, picked him up and cradled him in her arms. The gorilla was Binti Jua, an eight-year-old female who weighed over eighty kilogrammes. She held the boy tenderly and protected him from the other gorillas in the compound.

"I could not believe how gentle she was," said Celeste Lombardi, a zoo worker who had helped to raise Binti Jua.

With Koola, her own 18-month-old daughter on her back, Binti Jua carefully carried the boy to a service door where zoo workers were waiting. The boy, whose parents had requested that his name not be released, was badly injured. He had a broken hand, some cuts on his face and minor bruising to the brain. But after several days in the hospital, he was back home. Meanwhile, Binti Jua, whose name meant 'daughter of sunshine' in Swahili, became a national hero. Gifts of money and bananas poured into the zoo in honour of the gentle gorilla.

No one knows for certain why Binti Jua rescued the boy. Perhaps she was simply following some animal instinct or perhaps her actions stemmed from her past contact with humans. As an infant, Binti Jua had been rejected by her own mother and since she was two months old, she had been raised by humans. These same trainers had taught Binti Jua how to be a good mother, including how to bring Koola to the service door so zoo workers could monitor the baby's health. Jack Hanna, director of the Columbus Zoo, commented that when Binti Jua saw the child lying in the habitat, "she learnt from humans taking care of her that they could take care of this problem." In any case, Binti Jua's extraordinary act saved the little boy's life.

Binti Jua is not the only animal to surprise people with her heroism. Why are people surprised by the heroic actions of animals? Perhaps it is because they do not expect animals to understand human needs. Perhaps they do not think animals are capable of helping humans unless trained to do so. Whatever the reason, people are often amazed by animal heroics.
