
ONE MAN'S DREAM

The museum is the brainchild of David Wong who reveals that his passion for toys began with his very first toy - a gift of a small train by his father when he was seven. Over the years, he has assembled an amazing collection of toys from every corner of the world dating from Victorian times - charming wooden dolls - up to current computerized games.

David's collection became so vast that he decided to open a toy museum for the public's enjoyment. David's other reason for opening the toy museum was to allow him to carry on collecting the rarest of dolls, teddies, board games, trains and robots for display. Thus, visitors can see and admire these rare toys.

The MUSEUM



David's first toy train


