



What is The Pocket Money Fund?

The Fund is a community project to provide pocket money to children from low-income families to help them through school. The children can use this money for school-related expenses, such as buying a meal during recess, paying for transport or purchasing of school textbooks.

Student Eligibility:

Applicants have to fulfil all of the following criteria to be eligible for the Fund:

- 1. A student enrolled in a national school
- 2. Total family income of \$3000 and less
- 3. A Singapore citizen or permanent resident
- 4. Living in a HDB four-room flat or a smaller unit

Note: School grades are not a factor for consideration.

Primary school students receive \$60 a month while secondary school students receive \$95 a month.

"My father works odd jobs and his pay can hardly support the family, which includes my two sisters, aged 7 and 9. My mother suffers from a bad right knee. It is painful for her to walk and it also prevents her from working.

My sisters and I receive pocket money from the Fund to pay for essentials like food. I'm thankful for my neighbours who often bring us fruits and biscuits too. Not having to worry about my meals allows me to focus on my revision for PSLE.

I hope to graduate with at least a diploma eventually so that I can find a job that pays well. If not, I don't know how I can repay my parents. Last but not least, I also feel indebted to the strangers who have contributed to the Fund."
