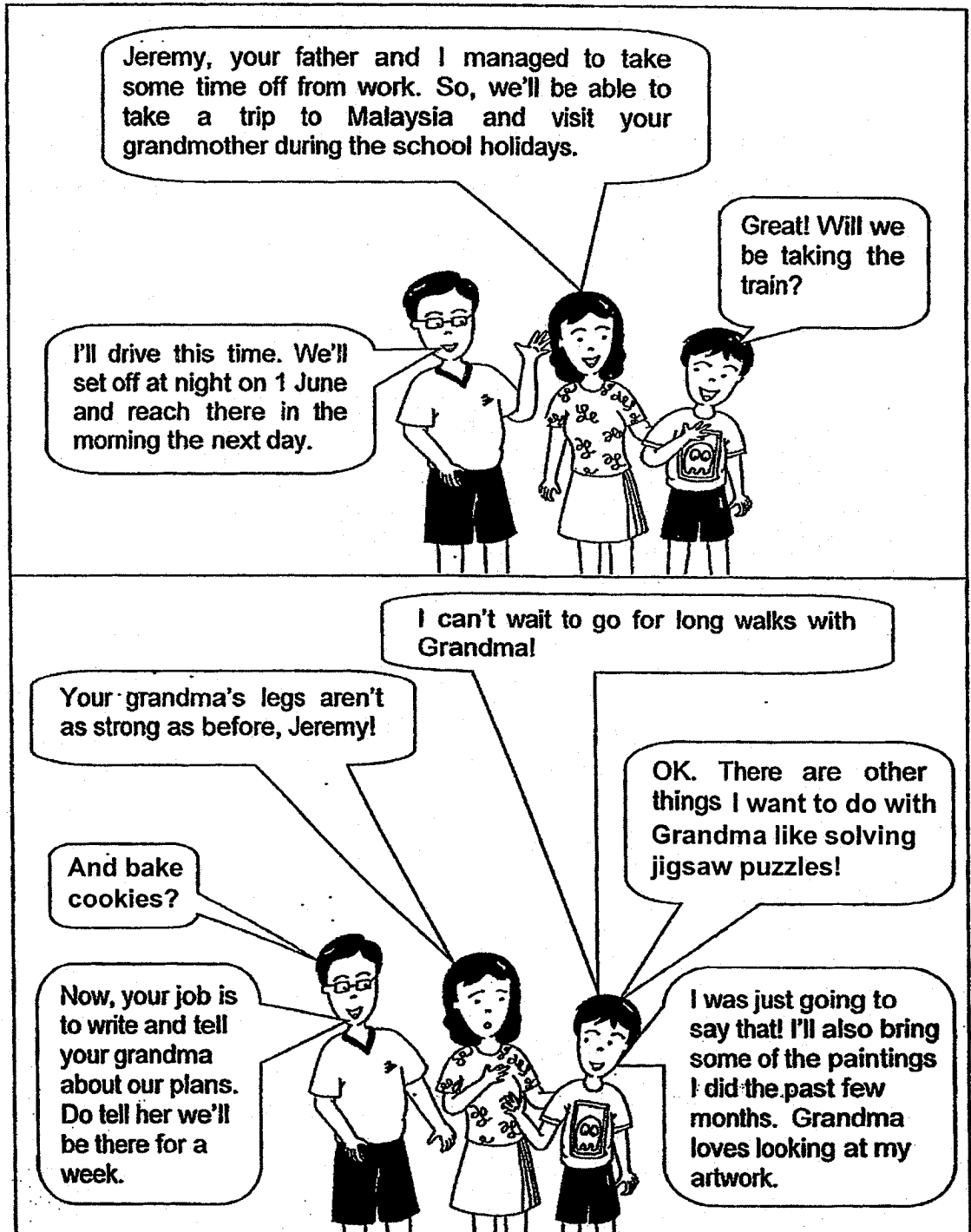

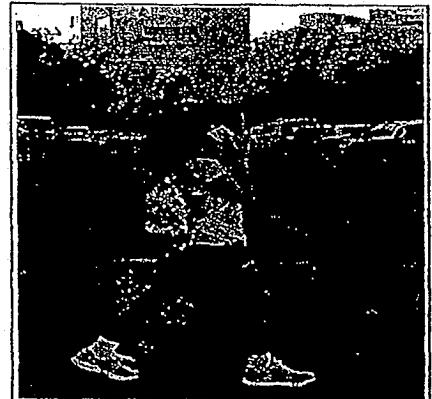

The spitting spider is found all over the world. It is tiny – only four to six millimetres long – and has a novel way of catching food. When it gets close enough to its prey, often a fly, the spider raises its head. It fires two streams of sticky gum from the tiny holes above its fangs, shaking its head from side to side so that the gum forms a zigzag pattern. The prey is glued to the ground. The menacing spider then closes in on it and gives a fatal poisonous bite. Once the fly is dead, the spider removes the threads of sticky silk from it before starting to eat. The spitting spider consumes its meal on the spot rather than taking the prey back to its lair like other types of spiders.

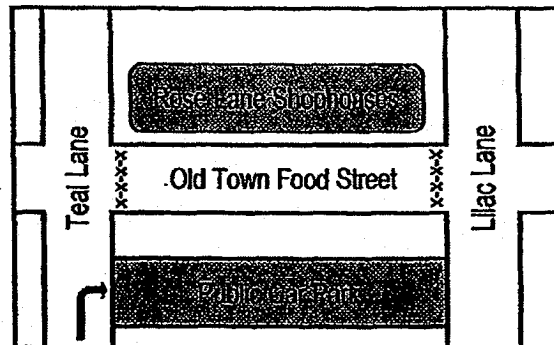
"We wanted to give the people from our generation the chance to take a walk down memory lane and savour local delights prepared from makeshift carts, just like the good old days," Mr Tan said.
