Wildlife biologist Joe Burnett, 38, first became interested in condors when he did a stint at the Oregon Zoo while he was still in college. He later became condor field supervisor for the Ventana Wildlife Society, in charge of repopulating the forests of Central California with **the species**.

5 With its hunched shoulders and bald, wrinkled head, the California condor is not much to look at up close. In flight, however, the giant scavenger transforms itself into the majestic thunderbird of Native American lore with its wingspan stretching to ten feet. The mighty birds once ranged from western Canada to Mexico, but their numbers dwindled as humans invaded their habitats. Settlers
10 often shot condors on sight. Curio collectors stole their eggs and the birds died of lead poisoning by eating bullet-riddled animal carcasses. By the mid 1980s, only nine condors remained in the wild, all in California. Today, despite a two-decade effort by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to breed the birds in captivity and release them into the wild, fewer than 175 California condors are flying
15 free.

Joe, who saw the urgency in saving these birds, helped Ventana build a compound in the mountains of Big Sur, with a pen for holding and training young condors. He tagged them and fitted them with transmitters before they were freed and trapped them regularly for medical checkups. He hauled dead
20 calves up steep slopes to make sure the birds received a healthy breakfast.

Once a wild fire burned 163,000 acres of the forest, including the Big Sur holding pen. Two free-flying condors were lost. Soon afterward, when Joe climbed a charred redwood tree to investigate why a pair of condors kept returning to it, he made an astonishing discovery. In a hollow at the top of the
25 200-foot tree, a six-month-old condor chick had somehow survived the blaze. "It was like the phoenix sitting there in a bed of ashes," said Joe.

The noise from the crowd got louder and we could hear shrill screams of women.

30 When we got back into town that night, the whole town was buzzing and everybody was talking about the sea monster. There was no doubt that the beast had been a sensational success. Homer, our spy on the beach, said all the women on the beach had screamed. And, when he left the beach, police cars had arrived and were sweeping the lake with their spotlights.

40 We took the monster out a couple more times that week and the crowd just about went wild. The newspaper offered a reward to anyone who could get a picture of the beast, and people started flocking into Mammoth Falls from all over. Lake cabins were being rented for four times as much as they used to be. All the stalls by the lake were doing a booming trade, and the restaurants and one hotel in town couldn't handle the crowd.

45 Soon, we realised we had a tiger by the tail. Business was so good, and the people in town were so happy, that we didn't dare stop taking the monster out, even though it was wearing us out.

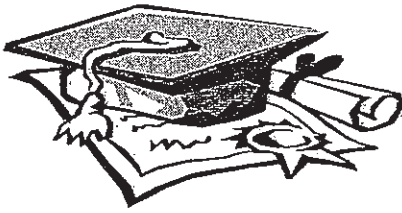

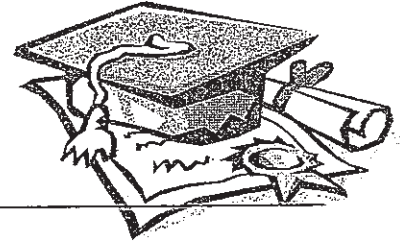
