

Brazil ldcks off the World Cup this week. Fans will be hoping to see the daring, imaginative play they have come to (21) associate with the distinctive yellow shirt. Call them accidents. Call them mistakes. Even serendipity.

If the truth were known, we might be amazed by the number of great inventions and discoveries that were accidental, unplanned and unintentional.

In the year 1174, Bonnano Pisano, an Italian engineer, began work on a bell tower for the cathedral in Pisa, Italy. When Pisano started, he had no idea that it would become a tourist attraction and one of the most famous structures in the world. Nor did he guess it would be famous because of a mistake.

The tower was to be 185 feet high. Construction started and three storeys were completed.

Then the tower began to lean. The soil beneath the tower was soft and the ten foot-thick foundation was not strong enough to support the weight.

Pisano tried to offset the lean by making the new storeys slightly taller on the short side, but the extra building materials caused the tower to lean even further.

Construction was halted for almost a hundred years.

In 1275, construction of the tower began again. This time, two storeys were built out of line with the previously built storeys, in a fruitful attempt to alter its centre of gravity.

The tower was finally finished in the fourteenth century, but each year it leans 1.25 millimetres, about a quarter of an inch. It currently tilts 5 degrees or about 17 feet.

In 1934, the Italian government pumped concrete under the base to try to correct the leaning, but the tilt increased. Architects are still searching for a solution.

While the town of Pisa enjoys the money tourists bring when they visit the Leaning Tower of Pisa, they fear someday their tower will lean too far and become the Toppled Tower of Pisa.

He and his friend, Richard, loved the freedom of sailing over the waves, but more than that, it was the thrill of the hunt that attracted them.

Conditions were sunny and calm as the pair headed out to sea. They called the local marine rescue group to tell them where they were going and when they expected to be back — an essential precaution in the shark-infested seas of Western Australia, where the weather is unpredictable.

Soon after setting out to the deep sea, they caught a mackerel. Excited, they scanned the depth sounder for signs of the shoal. Sure enough, there were large shadows but nothing was biting.

"I'll go down and have a look," said Damin, an experienced diver. He put on his dive gear, marked the spot where he was going down and went over the boat into the sea. "If I don't come back, make sure they find my body," he joked.

Darrin hit the bottom. All he could see was sand and great clumps of weed. That explained the shadows. However, Darrin was undeterred. He was on the hunt, moving towards where he thought the reef and the fish would be.

Just then, he saw a yellowtail kingfish and chased it. As he followed the creature, two alarm bells sounded at the back of his mind. The increasing movement in the water could indicate the arrival of a westerly and he was getting further and further away from the boat. "It's going to be lumpy up there. I would rather stay down here," he thought.

It was when he resurfaced from the sea, having used all his air, that Darrin realised his predicament. The westerly had indeed arrived. There were 3-metre waves and 70km/h winds. The sun was still bright and the sunlight was catching on the waves and making visibility near impossible. "Boy, I can't see the boat," Darrin thought.

Darrin was a strong swimmer but even with flippers he made no progress. He kept swimming into the wind and the waves and getting mouthfuls of seawater. He assessed his situation rationally. The recommended thing to do was to stay where he was and wait for recovery. However, he could see the sun going down and knew that even if a search was launched, there was very little chance of anyone seeing him in the waves. "I'll have to swim to shore to get out of this," he

thought. Back in the boat, Richard waited and waited but caught no sign of Darrin in the choppy waters. He knew he had to raise the alarm. The sea rescue team told him to stay where he was. Susan, Darrin's wife, was 40 already frantic. Her first thought was Darrin had been taken by a shark. After swimming solidly for two hours, things got nasty. Darrin knew he could control some of the variables - the direction of his swim, his fatigue, the speed with which he swam. However, the swallowing of seawater combined with the rocking motion of the waves made Darrin 45 nauseous. He started vomiting violently. He could not control these at all. He fretted. As he used the last few ounces of strength, the beach began to creep closer and closer. With a surge of Joy, he felt the sand beneath his feet. 50 "He's safe," Richard telephoned Susan. Susan's joy was tempered by anger. "Tell him that he doesn't have to come home. I'm going to kill him," was her first reaction after more than two hours fearing her husband was dead. 55 A couple of days later, Darrin's dive gear was washed ashore and was returned. He has not used it yet again. The rescue group commented that Darrin had made the right decision. Otherwise the chances of him being found alive were minimal.
