

The place is a dump but beauty thrives there, as nature lovers are set to discover on Pulau Semakau, Singapore's sole working landfill. From June this year, the Ministry for the Environment and Water Resources will embark on its proposal to allow nature lovers to walk through the island's mangrove mudflats that span twenty football fields and explore the teeming western and northern shoreline of the island. When the Environment and Water Resources Minister presented the plan to Parliament yesterday, he announced that it was part of ongoing efforts to open up more areas for all citizens to enjoy the environment.

Fishing enthusiasts can also get hooked. There is sport fishing to be enjoyed at man-made salt-water ponds created for rubbish but which have not yet been filled up. The activities will be led by selected recreational and nature groups. Those keen must register with these groups to get there. This is because there are no regular ferry rides and they need to be guided to nicer parts of the island.

Although the main activity on the six-year-old landfill is the daily dumping of rubbish into its ponds, it is currently using less than half its available space. It is only expected to be completely filled up by the year 2040 when all eleven ponds are filled. Waste, such as treated sludge, non-bumable trash and ash from incineration plants, is dumped there. Once each pond is filled, a layer of soil is capped on top of the rubbish to allow vegetation to grow. More vegetation can be expected in future as more ponds are filled.

In its development, a concerted effort has been put in to make the island scenic and not smelly. Said the Minister, "Many people generally picture landfills as dirty and smelly places. Preliminary surveys conducted on Semakau have revealed a significant variety of flora and fauna, which makes this island unique." The Ministry's officials had done a study on the island in October last year after observing the island's pristine conditions.

Already, several groups approached have told the Ministry they want a piece of the action. These include the nature group, Wild Singapore, which wants to conduct biodiversity surveys, the Nature Society, which is keen on bird-watching and the Sport Fishing Association of Singapore. Others who have already been there on organised group visits include specially invited guests and officials. The idea of a landfill as a nature and recreational retreat is attractive, say the groups.

A member of the Sport Fishing Association who has visited the place said, "I can't think of anywhere else in Singapore where they have done something like this." An avid bird-watcher remarked, "Since 1998, mangrove vegetation was replanted on the western side of the island. This whole area now contains a lot of interesting bird species, such as the Great-billed Heron which is an endangered species. These can be spotted in the mangroves and rocky shores of the island and I am confident to see more rare species regularly in future."
