

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

Our first few runs of snowboarding were awesome though the wind had buffeted all sides. By then, we had about twenty skiers, climbers and boarder in sight. The snow showed no signs of weakness and so we did not plan on digging any pits to check the stability of the layers underneath. Besides, this was considered a safe area for skiing. In other words, I was all too confident in the snow and my ability to react to 15 challenges in the mountain. A thought I later regretted too.

On the way down, Gordon spotted some avalanche debris, the first we saw. That should have raised our avalanche awareness.

When we were snowboarding down the steep slope, we paused at what we saw: a terrain trap. A wave of snow rushing down here would bury anyone unlucky enough to be stuck there.

I could see a safe way out at the other side of the slope. "Let's get out of here," I told Gordon. I did not even look uphill. If I had, I might have noticed an avalanche slope, ready to rip.

"Slide!" Gordon yelled.

A second later, the snow in front of me started to move. I was standing on an island of snow that was going downhill. However, I had no fear. It was a little avalanche and I knew I could easily ride it out. Instantly I turned my board around. That was when I realised it was taking me down into the terrain trap. This was going to be serious.

From my avalanche training, I knew I should toss aside my snowboard and backpack immediately as they could drag me under the snow. I did not do that. I figured I could still make it, and I was right — until the second wave hit. In a flash, a 2-metre high wave of snow rolled over me and I was gone. I finally came to a stop, entombed in freezing coldness. Clearly, I was not going to get out by myself. It was up to Gordon.

I knew Gordon did not have a transceiver, but did he have his probe? I knew he had his shovel but how deep was I? Was I going to die right here? All I could think of was my family.

I tried to call out to Gordon again, but my breath had melted the snow, which was then starting to freeze around my head, greatly reducing the oxygen flow. I had given


