Some people refer to Caucasian Americans and African Americans as "pink" people and "brown" people respectively. While these phrases are more accurate than the usual "white" people and "black" people, the American people are more comfortable with the latter phrases. This is because people choose to divide the population with labels like "white" and "black"

Many African Americans feel that they are viewed as second-class citizens, as compared to their first-class fellow citizens who are "white". This belief probably stems from the fact that many poor neighbourhoods in America are populated mainly by African Americans.

American ghettos, which are almost always black neighbourhoods, have always had crime and violence. But crime and violence were much worse in the 19th century slums, which were almost all white. The murder rate in Boston in the 19th century was about three times what it was in the 20th century. All the black riots of the 1960s put together did not kill as many people as the number of people killed in one white riot in 1863.

The meaning of the term "race riot" has been watered down in recent times to include strong and angry protests about issues close to the heart. In the 19th century, it was much uglier. Thousands of members of one "race" invaded the neighbourhood of another "race" to maim, murder and burn — and both these races were typically made up of "white" people. Today's riots involving "black" people hardly result in any bloodshed and buildings are left more or less intact.

Many black neighbourhoods are overcrowded and ridden with dirt and disease. But in 19th century New York, there were ten to thirty thousand children with no homes. These children slept under bridges and huddled against buildings to shelter themselves from the elements.

In conclusion, violence, poverty and destroyed lives are problems Americans have faced throughout history. At each point in history, these problems have afflicted a different group of people. But these problems should never be accepted – whether they involve "black" people or "white" people. Therefore, instead of wondering if a problem is a "white" problem or a "black" problem, we should gather our resources together, solve these problems and move forward towards a better age.





As they began to pace themselves, the runners were running way ahead. It was then that my eyes were drawn to a woman in blue running shorts and a baggy white T-shirt. She clenched her fists tightly. She pushed herself forward, ready to begin the race.

"Doug, look!"

We knew we were already watching our "last runner." Her teet were turned in, yet her left leg was turned out. Her legs were so crippled and bent that it seemed impossible for her to be able to walk, let alone run a marathon.

Doug and I watched in silence as she slowly moved forward. We did not utter a word. We would move forward slightly, then stop and wait for her to gain some distance. Then we would slowly move a little more! As I watched her struggle to put one foot in front of the other, I found myself cheering for her and urging her forward. I wanted her to stop, and at the same time, I prayed that she would not.

Finally she was the only runner left in sight. Tears streamed down my face as 1 sat on the edge of my seat and watched with awe, amazement and even reverence as she pushed forward with sheer determination through the last miles.

When the finish line came into sight, trash lay everywhere and the cheering crowds had long gone home. Yet, standing straight and ever so proud waited a lone man.
