

Read the passage below and answer the questions 26 to 30.

There are two schools of thought about how much sleep we ought to have. There are some who think we can leave the body to regulate these matters itself. "The answer is easy," says one authority. "With the right amount of sleep you should wake up fresh and alert in five minutes before the alarm rings." If he is right, many people must be under sleeping, including myself. But we must remember that some people have a greater inertia than others. This is not meant rudely: they switch on slowly, but also they are reluctant to switch off; they are alert at bedtime and sleepy when it is time to get up and this may have nothing to do with how fatigued their bodies are, or how much sleep they must take to dispel their fatigue.

Other people feel sure that the current trend is towards too little sleep. To quote one medical opinion: "Thousands of people drift through life suffering from the effects of too little sleep. The reason is not that they can't sleep but that they just don't." One can sympathise with this impression. We are depriving ourselves of sleep to meet our waking needs, pushing the boundary back and reaching to a point in our evolution where we will sleep no more. This in itself, of course, need not be a bad thing. What could be disastrous, however, and what these people fear, is that we should press too quickly towards this goal, sacrificing sleep only to gain more time which may jeopardize our actions and decisions due to fatigue and neurosis.

Then, to complete the picture, there are those who believe that most people are persuaded to sleep too much. Dr H Roberts, writing in *Everyman in Health*, asserts: "It may safely be affirmed that, just as the majority eat too much, so the majority sleep too much." One can see the point of this also; it would be a pity to retard our development by holding back those people who are gifted enough to work and play well with less than the average amount of sleep, if indeed it does them no harm. If one of the trends of evolution is that more of the life span is to be spent in gainful waking activity then surely these people are moving in the right direction.



Hardly a day goes by in Japan without a festival occurring somewhere in the
country. Festivals are usually noisy celebrations. They include lively processions, games
and loud music.
The biggest (51) of all in Japan is the New Year which falls on

it was a hot, humid day at Provident Hospital. "He will die if nothing is done, but what can we do?" Dr Dan did not like to hear this negative thinking. "There is always hope until the very end. We will have to open his chest to see how serious the wound is." 15 "That is unheard of; it is an open invitation to death," exclaimed the other doctor. "We had better just keep him warm and let him rest. This hospital cannot afford to get a bad reputation. You will not be condemned if he dies. He is near death." Dr Dan stiffened with anger and determination. He stared at the other 20 doctor and commanded him to assist. Antibiotics were given to the patient to fight infection. This, too, was unique, for it was recently that Lister's and Pasteur's studies had proved disease was caused by the spread of germs. Dr Dan worked swiftly, and when he opened the chest cavity, he saw that the wound had penetrated the heart about one-tenth of an inch, cutting the sac around the heart. 25 The atmosphere was tense. No one knew what to expect. Dr Dan often did the unexpected, but what would he do now? "This man has to live. He's too young to die," Dr Dan said with fierce determination. Bravely, he sewed up the heart sac with the precision of an artist. Questions spread around the hospital like wildfire. Would it work? Would the 30 patient live? Would the infection kill the patient? Would some other complication set in?

Three and a half years after the operation, the headlines of the local newspaper read, "Sewed Up His Heart". Williams had received worldwide acclaim after he finally filed his official report about the success of the historic operation. James Cornish, the man who was operated on, lived for fifty years after the operation. Dr Daniel Hale Williams's contribution to medicine was phenomenal. He had successfully entered the chest cavity and performed surgical repair of the heart. His methods were so good that no sign of infection appeared in the patient. Considering the times, his achievement was miraculous.
