



## KING OF GODS, KING OF PLANETS

Jupiter is the largest planet in the solar system. Approximately 143,000 kilometres wide at its equator, Jupiter is so large that all of the other planets in the solar system could fit inside it. More than 1,300 Earths would fit inside Jupiter!

Jupiter is the fifth planet from the sun, named after the king of the Roman gods. It is usually the second brightest planet in the sky, after Venus.





- One of the most extraordinary features is the Great Red Spot. It is a giant spinning storm, resembling a hurricane.
- At its widest point, the Great Red Spot is about three-and-a-half times the diameter of Earth. Its edge spins counter-clockwise around its centre at a speed of about 360 kph.
- The colour of the storm, usually varies from brick red to slightly brown, may come from small amounts of sulphur and phosphorus in the ammonia crystals in Jupiter's clouds.
- The spot grows and shrinks over time, and every now and again, it seems to fade entirely.
- Jupiter rotates or spins faster than any other planet. A day on Jupiter is only about 10 hours long!
- Jupiter has 62 known moons. The most recent moons were discovered in 2003.
- . The planet's four largest moons are called the Galilean satellites. They were first observed in 1610 by Italian astronomer, Galileo Galilei, when he was using an earlier version of the telescope.
- Jupiter has three thin rings. The rings were discovered in 1979 by NASA's Voyager 1 spacecraft. These rings are made up mostly of tiny dust particles.
- A new spacecraft named Juno is on its way to Jupiter. It was launched in August 2011 and will arrive at Jupiter in 2016. The goal of Juno is to help scientists better understand the origin and evolution of Jupiter and how planets form.


