

Easy to follow healthy recipe for Steamed Muffins contributed by Sally Cheng

This recipe makes 6 muffins. Each one contains 70 calories.

Ingredients:

- 60g sugar
- 25ml water
- 50g wholemeal flour
- 50g plain flour
- 4g baking powder
- 1 egg
- 60ml low fat milk

- Line the muffin trays with muffin cups.
- Boil the sugar with 25ml of water in a pot.
- Sieve wholemeal flour, plain flour and baking powder into a mixing bowl.
- Add the egg, milk and sugar to the flour mixture and stir well together.
- Pour the mixture to fill each of the muffin cups.
- Place the muffin trays into the steamer.
- Steam them over high heat for 15-20 minutes.

Salvador loved the simple lines of the fiberglass craft. No cabin or roof. Just a 7-metre-long narrow canoe-shaped boat designed to carve up waves like a huge surfboard, with the engine mounted on the back.

Salvador was a poor fisherman living and working in Mexico. On this day, November 1, 2012, Salvador planned to head out into the Pacific Ocean at 10am, and work straight through until 4pm the next day. Loading the boat involved over 400 kilogrammes of fishing equipment and a 1.5-metre-long and 1 metre high icebox that would soon be filled with tuna, shark and other fish.

Salvador had been warned that a storm was coming, but there was little that would keep him from embarking because he'd make enough money to feed his family for a week.

As he blasted through the waves some 120 kilometres from land, Salvador let out his three-kilometre-long fishing line. The storm was gaining strength on land but had yet to reach his boat. That changed around 1am. Waves rocked the small boat, which began to tilt sideways like an amusement park ride. Salvador then made the decision to head back.

With the winds and waves kicking up, the boat began to fill with water. Salvador could not bail and pull in the fishing line at the same time. With the crashing waves filling the boat with water faster than he could empty it, Salvador made a difficult decision. He cut the line, dumping thousands of dollars' worth of equipment and fish into the sea. He then pointed his boat towards his home port which was six hours away. Salvador called his boss, Willie, to report his position. Shortly after that, the radio died.

With the coming dawn, Salvador spotted the rise of mountains on the horizon. He was figuring out a safer route to the shore when the motor coughed. "I couldn't believe it," said Salvador. "The motor died."

He yanked on the cord of the outboard motor. Then he yanked again and again until the cord snapped. High waves raised and dropped the boat, sending Salvador crashing into the sides.

It was five days before the winds finally eased. Salvador was now 450 kilometres offshore. The only likely rescue was by being spotted by another boat. But that was difficult, as the craft sat low in the water. From more than a kilometre away, he was virtually invisible.

Salvador told himself to be positive and that a rescue mission would find him. But Salvador had no flare gun and no way to call for help. "That was when I knew. I was very far from the coast," said Salvador. "A place where no fishermen go."

The sun during the day made it feel as if he was being cooked alive. During the cold nights, he would climb inside the icebox and huddle for warmth. Thirst had become an obsession, as had starvation. "I was so hungry that I was eating my own fingernails," said Salvador.

When it eventually rained, Salvador showered in a glorious deluge of freshwater. By the time it stopped, he had collected freshwater in the plastic bottles which he had found floating in the sea, enough to last a week if rations were kept to a minimum.

Salvador was now surviving on small, bony triggerfish caught by hand, and the occasional turtle. He soon hunted seabirds that perched on the boat. While this kept away the worst effects of starvation, he faced severe fatigue and hallucinations.

Struggling with loneliness, Salvador designed a shark-detection system that permitted him to take brief swims. First, he tossed some bird feet into the water. If no sharks appeared, he lowered himself in and went for a refreshing but nerve-wrecking swim. When the smaller fish that lived under his boat were relaxed, he was relaxed, and when they panicked, he scampered back aboard. "I would imagine I was at the beach with my friends, going for a swim," he said. "Getting off the boat allowed me to relax, even if it was for five minutes.

On January 30, 2014, Salvador was washed onto the Ebon island, one of the most remote spots in the world. He was discovered by the lone couple who lived there. Had Salvador missed this island, the next likely stop was the Philippines, some 5 000 kilometres away.


It took Salvador 11 days for his health to stabilise before he was able to travel home. Salvador had completed one of the most remarkable voyages in the history of seafaring. He didn't navigate, sail, row or paddle – he drifted. Unable to alter course, he had been forced to build a world of survival. He was extremely unlucky and terribly fortunate at the same time.

And now he was home.
